



God Protects Baby Moses:

Lesson 25 Visuals

- **Pharaoh and the Egyptians were afraid of the Israelites because there were so many of them.**
- **Pharaoh first tried to lower the number of Israelites by forcing them to be slaves.**
- **Pharaoh told Shiphrah and Puah, the midwives, to kill any Hebrew baby boy that they helped deliver.**
- **The midwives refused to obey Pharaoh because they feared God more than Pharaoh.**



- **God rewarded Shiphrah and Puah by giving them families of their own.**
- **Pharaoh came up with a third plan to oppress the Hebrew people. Pharaoh ordered all the Hebrew baby boys to be thrown into the Nile River.**
- **Proverbs 1:7 says, “The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge.”**
- **Amram and Jochebed hid Moses, their newborn baby boy, for three months.**
- **Jochebed put Moses in a papyrus basket coated with tar and pitch. Then she placed that basket among the reeds in the Nile River.**



- **Moses' older sister Miriam stood at distance to see what would happen to baby Moses.**
- **Pharaoh's daughter came to the Nile River to bathe.**
- **Miriam asked Pharaoh's daughter if she wanted her to get one of the Hebrew women to nurse the baby.**
- Pharaoh's daughter said "Yes, take this baby to her to nurse him and tell her I will pay her to do it."**
- **Jochebed, Moses' own mother, was able to nurse and care for baby Moses.**
- **After Moses stopped nursing, he became the son of Pharaoh's daughter.**



- **Pharaoh wanted to kill Moses because he killed an Egyptian while defending a Hebrew slave.**
- **Moses rescued Jethro's daughters from rude shepherds. Jethro was the Priest of Midian.**
- **Jethro liked Moses so much that he allowed him to marry his daughter Zipporah.**
- **Moses became a shepherd who cared for his father-in-law's sheep.**
- **God heard the Israelites groaning as they suffered as slaves and who remembered the covenant promise to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.**



- **The Pharaoh who wanted to kill Moses died.**
